KITTEN VISIT #3

Congratulations! This is the final kitten vaccine visit. By completing the series of kitten vaccine visits, you have provided your kitten with the best possible protection against these diseases. Annual boosters will keep this protection at the most effective levels. After today's visit you will receive reminder notices when your kitten's vaccine boosters are due.

VACCINATIONS

RABIES: Your kitten will receive its first Rabies vaccine today. By law, this is a 1-year vaccine that should be boosted in a year. You will receive a Rabies vaccination certificate and tag today. The tag can be attached to your cat's collar or you can keep it in a safe place, as it is a legal proof of current Rabies vaccination.

FLEAS & TICKS

We continue to recommend Frontline Gold to kill fleas and ticks in cats as this is a major problem for pets in our area. For continued protection, we suggest this product be used monthly.

HEARTWORMS

If you have any questions regarding giving your cat heartworm bring it to the attention of the Veterinarian or Technician.

INTESTINAL PARASITES

If parasites were detected in a previous fecal exam and medicine was prescribed, a second fecal test should be performed to be assured that the treatment was effective in ridding those parasites.

SPAYING & NEUTERING/DECLAWING

ALL cats that are not going to be used for showing or breeding *SHOULD* be spayed (females) or neutered (males) to prevent undesired pregnancies, as well as inevitable hormone related health problems.

SPAYING (ovariohysterectomy) prevents annoying heat cycles and the associated odd behavior in female cats, as well as preventing pregnancy and decreasing the future risk of breast cancer.

NEUTERING (castration) helps prevent hormone related behaviors such as urine spraying, territorial fighting and roaming, as well as drastically reducing the odor of male cat urine.

DECLAWING is best done at the time your pet is spayed or neutered. Laser declaw is a safe procedure involving the removal of toenails from either the front, or both front and back feet.

Spaying or neutering can be performed as early as 6 months of age (AAHA Standard of Care).

NEXT VISIT – ONE YEAR

You will receive a reminder notice for your cat's annual vaccine boosters and fecal exam 1 year from this final kitten visit.

EMERGENCY CARE

Please contact the *PAW Health Network Animal Emergency Center* in Mosinee at 715-693-6934. The Emergency Center's standards of care most closely mirror Woodland Veterinary Clinic, Ltd. They are open from 6pm – 8am, Monday – Thursday; and 5pm Friday – 8am Monday; as well as holidays. From Wisconsin Rapids, it should take about 45 minutes to get there.
